## 2021 Washington City Management Report


Dear Resident,

Property Tax Assessed on \$450,000 Home





## 2021 Accomplishments


27.3 Miles of road crack sealed and slurried.

Streamline the commercial development process by migrating to electronic submittals and online applications for economic development resources and tools.
